

## GARDEN HIGHLIGHTS

- a b Pinery and Peach Case** – see where the most difficult of fruits were grown - these cases are awaiting restoration.
- 1 Orchards** – over 80 specimen of fruit trees and soft fruit types.
- 1 e Walled Kitchen Garden and Fig House** – 3 walled gardens with restored chimneys including an orchard.
- 3 Rose Garden** – laid out for Lady Anna Egerton around 1911 with a Byzantine style pool.
- 4 Tower Garden** – once the home of a hermit and now an ocean of tranquility.
- 14 Broad Walk** – once the main route from the estate to Knutsford.
- g Rhododendrons & Azaleas** – Rhododendrons are at their best from mid May and Azaleas from late June.
- 13 African Hut** – built to console Maurice Egerton who, due to illness, was unable to continue to visit his beloved Kenya where he had a private estate which still exists.
- 19 Choragic Monument** – based on the original monument in Athens and designed in 1820 to mark Wilbraham Egerton's tour of Europe.
- 18 Japanese Garden** – laid out for Alan de Tatton in 1910 after visiting the Anglo-Japanese Exhibition.
- 17 Pinetum** – over 150 tree specimens from around the world.
- i Giant Rhubarb** – *Gunnera Manicata*. Impressive plant growing throughout Spring into the Summer at over one metre per month.
- h Handkerchief Trees** – A deciduous tree from China with a striking display of floral bracts in late Spring.

- 11 Maze** – already well established in the late 1700s.
- 8 Italian Garden** – designed by Joseph Paxton of Crystal Palace fame in 1847 and skilfully terraced.
- 6 Conservatory** – Built to Lewis Wyatt's design in 1818 and restored in 2010.
- 7 Fernery and Show House** – houses many New Zealand and Australian tree ferns from the Egertons' travels.
- 5 Charlotte's Garden** – designed in 1814 by Lewis Wyatt with a curved seat arbour, giant yew topiary, central gazebo and south lawn.
